

Regular Meeting of Mayor and Council September 15, 2005

PRESENT: Mayor DeIorio; Councilmembers Badillo, Harms, Murphy, Matarante (late in at 8:35 p.m.) and Rubilla; Borough Attorney Bill Lane

Mayor DeIorio invited Councilman Kevin Murphy and Paul Endler to the dais to accept the resolution on behalf of the P.O.W./M.I.A. Organizations. Remembrance Day” in the Borough of Roselle Park and urged all citizens to make a special effort to give thanks and to remember the sacrifices rendered by all of those noble sons and daughters of America. Councilman Murphy said it is important to take the time to remember them and stated there are a number of servicemen still listed as missing in action. He said it is the responsibility of our Government to find these individuals or their remains in order to bring closure to the many families.

Councilman Badillo moved, at 8:20 p.m., to interrupt the regular order of business for a 5 minute recess; seconded by Councilman Harms and adopted.

Councilman Harms moved, at 8:25 p.m., to resume the regular order of business; seconded by Councilman Rubilla and adopted.

#### PASSAGE OF ORDINANCES

##### Second Reading and Public Hearing

An Ordinance (#2160) entitled, “AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 1930 REGARDING CHANGES IN BOROUGH OF ROSELLE PARK COMMUNITY CENTER AEROBICS FEES”, was brought up and read by title only on its second reading and public hearing.

Councilman Harms moved that the public hearing on Ordinance #2160 be opened; seconded by Councilman Murphy and adopted.

There being no one wishing to speak, Councilman Harms moved to close the public hearing; seconded by Councilman Rubilla and adopted.

Councilman Badillo moved that Ordinance #2160 be adopted on second reading and advertised as prescribed by law; seconded by Councilman Murphy.

Roll called, all members voting Aye, said Ordinance was adopted.

An Ordinance (#2164) entitled, “AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A YARD WASTE COLLECTION PROGRAM IN THE BOROUGH OF ROSELLE PARK”, was brought up and read by title only on its second reading and public hearing.

Councilman Badillo moved that the public hearing on Ordinance #2164 be opened; seconded by Councilman Murphy and adopted.

Jacob Magiera, 612 Sheridan Avenue, said he was at the meeting last night, at which Councilman Harms presided, and did a good job at explaining the ordinance. He thanked Council for the work they did and said the ordinance will be effective.

There being no one else wishing to speak, Councilman Badillo moved to close the public hearing; seconded by Councilman Harms and adopted.

Councilman Badillo moved that Ordinance #2164 be adopted on second reading and advertised as prescribed by law; seconded by Murphy.

Mayor DeIorio, Councilman Badillo and Councilman Rubilla congratulated Councilman Harms, saying the meeting he conducted was excellent.

Roll called, all members voting Aye, said Ordinance was adopted.

### PUBLIC COMMENT

Councilman Badillo moved, at 8:30 p.m., to open the public comment portion of the meeting; seconded by Councilman Harms and adopted.

Jacob Magiera, 612 Sheridan Avenue, said there are potholes on Chestnut Street between Webster and Grant which are getting bigger. He said there are garbage cans obstructing half of the sidewalk on Williams Street; the curbs are very high and people are being forced to walk closer to the curb where they can fall and hurt themselves. He asked what is happening with the parking meters, saying the Borough is losing about \$15,000.00 a year. Mr. Magiera said if there is a problem of adjusting the computerized meters they could send them over to the high school for the students to work on and get credits. He asked if there is an update concerning energy savings with municipal buildings and vehicles? Mayor DeIorio responded there is no additional information, although the Borough is looking at different avenues. He said some municipalities, during the summer, change their hours of operation to conserve energy and the Borough is testing those avenues. Mr. Magiera suggested starting with lowering the thermostats. He said for the years 2000 to 2004 cardboard tonnage was 1,251 tons, which comes out to 250 tons per year and asked if the Borough is paid when they pick up from the business section?

(Councilman Matarante arrived at 8:35 p.m.)

Mr. Magiera asked the Mayor to explain Resolution #110-05, authorizing membership in the NJ Intergovernmental Insurance Fund. Mayor DeIorio said the Borough has participated in the fund system for over a decade. He said it has been proven throughout the years that by joining a JIIF (Joint Intergovernmental Insurance Fund), and pooling many municipalities together to purchase insurance, that the cost savings is greater. When Mr. Magiera questioned Section 1B general liability coverage, Borough Attorney Bill Lane said should there be a suit against the Borough this insurance

company would pick it up. Mr. Magiera asked about Resolution #111-05 accepting bid of Jenicar Builders Contractors and asked if they are going to repair the grass section between the curb and the sidewalk on E. Colfax Avenue between Galloping Hill Road and Hemlock. Councilman Matarante said he asked Mr. Dec to take a look at that based on his request but has not heard back. Mr. Magiera said he gave Councilman Harms and to the Mayor an article “Footing the Mile Square City Bill” and stated that his tax dollars are going to the Hoboken School Board. He said Council is complaining about the abbot schools, and Hoboken is the upper class and they are getting abbot funding. He said they are giving someone a severance pay of \$350,000.00 for two years. He said it also states that Corzine is getting a bigger increase in his property tax subsidies. He asked how they determine abbot districts? Mayor DeLorio said Mr. Magiera was right on point and thanked him.

Councilman Rubilla said Mr. Magiera mentioned the parking meters and that maybe the high school children could be looking at them. When Councilman Rubilla asked if he spoke to anyone regarding that, Mr. Magiera said it was not his responsibility. Councilman Rubilla said with all his careful investigation, and Nancy Kinloch sitting to his right 6 feet away, and Board of Education President being there earlier, it would have been the perfect opportunity to ask.

There being no one else wishing to speak, Councilman Badillo moved, at 8:50 p.m., to close the public comment portion of the meeting; seconded by Councilman Rubilla as adopted.

Roll called, all members voting Aye, said resolutions were adopted.

**Resolution #111-05, accepting bid of Jenicar Builders Contractors for the reconstruction of Markthaler Place from Galloping Hill Road to Charlotte Terrace and the resurfacing of Hemlock Street from Lincoln Avenue to Colfax Avenue (\$252,902.82), was offered by Councilman Badillo and seconded by Councilman Murphy. (See app. pg. #      ).**

Councilman Badillo said he wanted this to be pulled so the residents on those streets know that bids have been accepted. He said Markthaler Place is going to be reconstructed and Hemlock resurfaced. He said the builder is Jenicar Builders and in the past if there have been any concerns they have been very good in responding. He said he would be sending the residents a letter with the resolution attached to it.

Councilman Harms said he spoke with Ed Dec who attended the meeting on the leaf program. He said if the resolution is approved tomorrow he will be meeting with the contractor next week to go over some details. He said Jenicar is currently working in Cranford and should be ready to start on Markthaler Place in September. He said because Hemlock has a concrete road and crowning, it will take longer to survey and make sure the water will run down to the catch basin without taking leaves with it.

Roll called, all members voting Aye, said resolution was adopted.

**Resolution #116-05, authorizing liquor license transfer from Freas, Incorporated, t/a Tavern in the Park to Solar Do Minho II, Inc., t/a Solar Do Minho Steak House II, was offered by Councilman Badillo and seconded by Councilman Murphy. (See app. pg. # ).**

Roll called, all members voting Aye, said resolution was adopted.

#### MATTERS FOR REFERRAL

Councilman Murphy said he received notification that on Election Day citizens will be asked to vote on a ballot question which would fund a diesel reduction program to improve the quality of air that we breath. He said in short a yes vote on the ballot would authorize a Statewide Diesel Retro Fit Program to reduce harm from soot and emissions. He said this would not require any new taxes from the residents or businesses. He said the retro fit program would be implemented using revenues from the constitutionally dedicated corporate business tax fund. Councilman Murphy said he wanted to thank members of the Rotary Club who were out cleaning the First Ward along Westfield Avenue, and he requested that Council recognize those members. He said after attending the meeting held by Councilman Harms last night, he went to Westfield to the Family Support Meeting for the homecoming of the 250 Signal Battalion.

**Councilman Murphy moved to sponsor a \$75.00 hole tee sponsor ad for the Roselle/Roselle Park Rotary Annual Golf Outing; seconded Councilman Badillo and adopted.**

Councilman Murphy said he had one item to discuss in closed session regarding the vacancy of the Purchasing Clerk position.

Councilman Harms thanked everyone for the nice comments and stated he could not have done it without the help of Frank Wirzbicki from the DPW. He said Frank made all the phone calls to see what other communities are doing. He said the questions were very good and he was glad he had the answers. He said there was one in particular about the Borough allowing residents to put leaves on the grass area along the curb, and indicated that the State said you cannot put out leaves uncontainerized. He said they have to be in some kind of open vessel or biodegradable brown bag if you do not have a plan to pick up within 7 days. He said the Borough cannot pick up leaves within a 7 day period with only a 12 man crew. He said if you use plastic bags, they will be left on your front lawn. Councilman Harms said they are going to send out postcards and will also be on TV34. He said the landscapers will be held to the same rules and regulations that every resident in the Borough is held to. He said they will be allowed to do bring leaves to the DPW Yard and drop them off; however, there are some rules that they have to follow. He said they will have to give the Borough a list of all their customers, and they will have to be licensed to work in the Borough. He said residents will be allowed to put leaves at the curb on County Roads, because they are giving you a date and are abiding

by the 7 days. He said the bottom line is the State, not the Borough, has mandated that we do this program. He said if Council agrees, they will allow residents to drop off leaves on Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the DPW Yard between November 1<sup>st</sup> and December 31<sup>st</sup>. He said leaf pickup starts on November 1<sup>st</sup>. Councilman Murphy noted that no plastic bags will be picked up even if they are biodegradable.

Borough Attorney Bill Lane recommended the Governing Body authorize the Mayor to sign the lease between the Borough and the Board of Education for use of the Youth Center.

**Councilman Matarante moved to authorize the Mayor to sign the lease agreement for use of the Youth Center between the Borough and Board of Education; seconded by Councilman Harms and adopted.**

**Councilman Matarante moved that a raffle license be granted to the Church of the Assumption for an off-premise 50/50 raffle to be held on November 19, 2005; seconded by Councilman Harms and adopted.**

**Councilman Matarante moved that a raffle license be granted to the Church of the Assumption for an on-premise 50/50 raffle to be held on November 19, 2005; seconded by Councilman Harms and adopted.**

Councilman Badillo said he wanted residents to know of the great job the library does with their programs and thanked Susan and Ms. Fran. Councilman Badillo said in keeping with the form of acknowledging people, one of the Councilmembers from Millburn brought up bringing to light families and acknowledging families and individuals that are the foundation of communities. He said he would like to send out letters and put a announcement on TV34 to honor those families that have made Roselle Park what it is today. He said many of the families that came up here today are second and third generation. He said Roselle Park is a great volunteer, blue collar town. Mayor DeIorio said it is a wonderful idea and suggested that the first step be having a discussion with Sandy Haymoff, who is the Committeewoman from Millburn who initiated their program. He said they are doing their acknowledgement this weekend and from what he has been told there are several hundred people. Councilman Badillo said he attended the Casano Center meeting and highlighted Karen Intile's report. He stated that the Health Fair will be held at Roselle Park High School on October 29<sup>th</sup>. Councilman Badillo said he attended the Roselle Park Little League meeting, and the Firemen's meeting where they asked if the 1957 Mack truck could be donated to a museum. He said Greg Mayers will be speaking with Mr. Lane to see if that is possible. Mayor DeIorio said he did not see any objections, but for the record requested a report from Mr. Lane before having it approved. He said Roselle Park schools will open on September 19<sup>th</sup> and wished the children well. He said he attended the West End Club Block Party and thanked them for inviting him. Councilman Badillo said the band, with Bob Litterer, is starting to put together a raffle for a 2006 red Mustang Convertible to raffle off in the hopes of raising enough funds for the band to purchase new uniforms.
