Susan Calantone – Library Director

- There are over 300 kids registered for the Summer Reading Program.
- As of August 1st, the fine structure will increase from 10 cents to 20 cents per day for overdue books at the Library.
- They are conducting a small fundraiser at the Library.
- Spoke about all upcoming programs at the Library.
- Spoke about the Library tax on the tax bill.

Vince Cahill – Superintendent of Public Works

- The pump station issue has been resolved.
- The overtime in question was the maintenance of the pump station until the new control panel was installed.

Councilwoman Torres thanked him for replacing the stolen plants at the gazebo. She also thanked the DPW for the recent tree trimming and the sidewalk replacement in the Third Ward. She asked that the tree that died in front of Sherman School be replaced.

Paul Morrison – Police Chief

- The decoy officers are out on pedestrian details.
- July 19th they are coordinating with the Union County Police Weight Team.
- There will be a checkpoint for overweight and unsafe trucks.
- Spoke about the red light cameras; there were over 800 violations last month.
- Spoke about the flag burning; will not be tolerated.
- It is an act of arson and they are attached to homes, which is also endangering a life.
- They will locate the persons responsible and will carry a heavy penalty.
- There were three incidents and the fourth one was reported today.
- A Union County First Alert was sent out message to the residents.
- The first incident was July 2nd and reported on July 3rd and the last one was July 11th.

Councilman Miranda said he is concerned that as Public Safety Chairman, he was not made aware of the incidents. In the future, he would like to be made aware of these incidents when they happen.

Joseph Signorello – Fire Chief

- Spoke about the fireworks.
- The lights on Locust Street will be installed shortly.
- The Farmer’s Market is open every Wednesday through the last Wednesday in October.

Mark Jaskula – Deputy Fire Chief

- Invited everyone to celebrate the wetdown of the new ladder fire truck on August 6th.
- There will be many activities for everyone on that day.

Councilman Caswell said it was a job well done regarding the sewer smoke testing.

Councilman Hokanson said residents will get a pink notice on their door when smoke testing is being done in their neighborhood. This will take place every Thursday for the next couple of months.

Fire Chief Signorello said the fire hydrants in town are being painted red, which makes them easier to see in the winter months.

Tom Solfaro – Borough Engineer

- Regarding the smoke testing, there are more areas to be addressed; they will coordinate with the Police Department and Fire Department and notify residents with pink door hangers.
- The contractor for Acker Park has returned and is addressing various items on the punch list.
- E. Grant Avenue has been paved.
- Chestnut Street Crosswalks have been repaired.
- They have received bids for ADA Handicapped Crosswalks and parts of W. Webster Avenue.
- The bids came in high, so it is recommended they be rejected.
- The smoke testing consists of smoke bombs put into sewers and blown in with fans.
- The smoke transports itself within the infrastructure of the sewer system.
- The smoke is non-toxic and the suggestion is if there are pets in the basement, move them to the first floor and open some windows.
- If anyone needs medical transport, call his office and they will assist with that.
- If the smoke does come into the basement, it can mean there is a connection that is attached to the sanitary sewer.

Councilman Hokanson thanked the Chief for working with Tom to keep the overtime down. He asked that an ordinance or resolution be put together to enforce the work on newly paved roads.

Ms. Cali said there is a current ordinance regarding newly paved roads.

Mr. Johnstone requested he be given a list of the damaged streets, and he will send a letter putting them on notice.

Councilman Hokanson said all the utilities are invited to the preconstruction meetings, but they are not showing up.

Blake Johnstone – Borough Attorney

- Has nothing new to report.

Doreen Cali – Borough Clerk

- One item for Closed Session, which is potential litigation regarding a tax matter.
- Request that Council do a resolution authorizing the Borough Attorney to handle the matter of the Concerned Citizens versus the Borough of Roselle Park in an amount not to exceed either \$5,000 or \$10,000.

Councilwoman Torres asked for more information as to what this is about.

Mayor Accardi said it can be pulled from the Consent Agenda and discussed at that time. The number for the resolution will be #160-11.

Ms. Cali said because it is in litigation, it can be discussed in Closed Session.

Ken Blum – Chief Financial Officer

- The estimated third quarter tax bills will be mailed, and are due August 1st with a grace period to August 10th.
- Sewer bills are now past due and the office can be called for interest calculations.
- Friday delinquent sewer bills will be mailed.
- Reminder to residents that sewer bills are not paid by mortgage companies.

Mayor Accardi said the tax bills are estimated because we don't have final approval from the State.

- Mr. Blum said we are still waiting to adopt our budget due to the Union County Utilities and Department of Environmental Protection to sign off on it.
- Until that is signed off on and approved, the State will not allow us to adopt our budget.

MOTION BILLS AND PAYROLLS BE NOT READ

MOTION BILLS AND PAYROLLS BE PASSED FOR PAYMENT

Councilman Miranda moved that bills and payrolls be not read and passed for payment; seconded by Councilman Dinardo, all members present voting Aye, said motion was adopted.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Councilman Miranda moved at 8:51 p.m. to open the public comment portion of the meeting; seconded by Councilman Dinardo and adopted.

Eugene Meola, 226 Sheridan Avenue

- Response from the people of Roselle Park to his granddaughter’s illness was wonderful.
- He thanked everyone from the bottom of his heart.

Nancy Reinhart, 425 Park Place

- She’s here to follow up on an issue regarding an ordinance blocking the ingress and egress on a person’s property and being able to park.
- The fence that is up her driveway is blocking her ingress and egress.
- Asked if anything is being done to stop people from putting up fences in their shared driveways.
- Her neighbor got a permit to put up a fence in the driveway and everyone else knew about it but her.
- Has not been able to access the rear of her property or garage since August of 2010.
- Councilwoman Torres’s comments and behavior towards her were unacceptable.

Mayor Accardi said the position of Council is that this is a dispute among neighbors and they will not get involved and this is not the forum to address the issue; the proper forum is

Court. Regarding the comment about Councilwoman Torres, since she has been on Council, he has nothing but praise for what she has done. What she has done has always been for the benefit of her Ward and has worked hard for the entire community. He is taken aback by her comments.

- Ms. Reinhart said she cannot see how this is not a Borough issue because she was issued a permit.

Councilman Hokanson said coming forward and attacking a member of Council should not be done.

Kurt Richardson, 422 Roosevelt Street

- Having a problem with the Code Enforcement Officer.
- Recently he had to go to Court and made to remove a tent style carport, which has been in his driveway since August 2001.
- Has never had complaints from his neighbors.
- Has photos of other people in town that have carports and does not see any of them having to remove them.
- Thinks the Code Enforcement Officer has a problem with him.
- He feels that he is being singled out.

Mayor Accardi said he is familiar with the situation. This was brought to their attention by other people in his neighborhood. If he knows of other carports in town, to let them know, so they can do equal enforcement. He apologizes if he feels he has been singled out. He said no one did this to him personally; as a Borough, we are trying to maintain the appearance of the community.

Councilman Miranda said there are other carports and they are also being addressed. It will also be addressed at a Municipal Services Meeting.

Glen Costello, 170 Jerome Street

- Asked the Borough Clerk if a Councilperson moves out of town, does that person have to resign from Council.
- Asked Councilman Dinardo if he has moved to Berkeley Heights.

Councilman Dinardo said at this point he lives at 127 Bender Avenue.

- Mr. Costello asked if Councilman Hokanson was aware that Councilman Dinardo moved.

Councilman Hokanson said no, he was not aware.

Glen Marzewski, 622 Sherman Avenue

- Flag burning is a disgraceful thing.

- Spoke about cell towers.
- Spoke about the utility companies tearing up roads.
- Spoke about block parties.
- Spoke about Library book fines.
- Has seen kids carrying cases of beer in town.

Mayor Accardi said regarding the flag burnings, he is sure the Police Department will catch the perpetrators. He also said regarding children wearing bicycle helmets, that they are wearing them in town.

Councilwoman Torres said they have just passed an ordinance about underage drinking. If anyone sees anything, to call the Police Department and report it and someone will check it out.

Jake Magiera, 612 Sheridan Avenue

- The flagpole in front of the DPW yard has been knocked down.
- Spoke about the flag burning.
- Spoke about the E. Grant Avenue paving at Magie Avenue.
- When the pavement ends at Magie Avenue there is a dip in the road.
- Asked for an explanation of Resolution #155-11.
- Asked if that amount could be used to reduce taxes.
- Asked for an explanation of Resolution #156-11.
- Asked about Resolution #157-11.
- Asked for a copy of the bills to be paid.

Mayor Accardi said everyone has there constitutional right to speak, but there are rules and decorum that must be followed as well. Regarding the bill list, it is available online on the Borough website. If you do not have access to online, then you may file an OPRA request for a hard copy of the list and it will be supplied to you.

- Mr. Magiera said he would like the amount that was refunded to the residents who had paid for permits for fences which the State of Jersey wrote to Mr. Jerry Eger to rescind permits and refund the fee.

Mayor Accardi responded Mr. Magiera's comments as follows:

- The matter of the fence permits is being investigated and is not on the bill list right now.
- The DPW is addressing the issue of the flagpole in front of the building.
- The DPW is aware of the dip in the road on Magie Avenue and is addressing that.
- The CFO will address Resolutions #155-11 and #157-11.

Mr. Blum said Resolution #155-11 is canceling capital projects that are deemed complete and have leftover monies due to going out to bid and prices coming in for less than anticipated.

It has been determined to cancel those items and re-appropriate them. The ordinance on the agenda tonight includes \$753,600 of surplus capital money, so we don't issue additional debt. It is not used in the current fund, it is capital surplus money but indirectly it is lowering taxes. Resolution #156-11 will have to be deferred to the Engineer and Resolution #157-11 are grants that are expired and have not been spent.

Ms. Cali said regarding #156-11 it is an application from Schering Plough Corporation for the Borough to endorse the application of a Sanitary Sewer Extension Expansion of Building K-15. She said because the application has not adequately demonstrated the design flow values for this application and the applicant has not demonstrated that adequate conveyance capacity exists in the Roselle Park downstream sanitary sewer system, the Borough will not endorse the application. This has to be done by formal resolution and sent to the Department of Environmental Protection.

There being no one else wishing to speak, Councilman Miranda moved to close the public hearing; seconded by Councilman Hokanson and adopted.

ORDINANCE NO. 2336

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE VI, OF THE CODE OF THE
BOROUGH OF ROSELLE PARK TO INCLUDE SECTION 6-8
REGARDING POSSESSION OR CONSUMPTION BY UNDERAGE
PERSONS ON PRIVATE PROPERTY

Councilman Miranda moved to open the public hearing on Ordinance #2336; seconded by Councilman Caswell and adopted.

Glen Marczewski, 622 Sherman Avenue

- Asked how this ordinance will be enforced.

Mayor Accardi said there are state laws regarding the drinking age. This ordinance addresses a problem in the community and the enforcement is up to the Police Department.

Councilman Miranda said if there is an incident and the Police have to be called to a residence and they determine there is underage drinking, then that is when this ordinance will be enforced. It is a tool the Police will be able to use.

Councilman Hokanson said in the State of New Jersey you must be 21 years of age to consume or purchase alcohol. He said as a parent in their own home, it is their decision as to whether someone underage can have a glass of wine. What we are looking at is that as a parent

and you decide to have a party with several underage people and they are drinking, it is a violation of this law. As homeowners and parents, they should be enforcing it. The Police Department is the last tool to come out to issue summons and make arrests. It is the parents' duty to make sure they are not serving alcohol to minors.

Councilwoman Torres this ordinance also serves as a tool for parents who are not aware their child may be drinking.

There being no one else wishing to speak, Councilman Miranda moved to close the public hearing; seconded by Councilwoman Torres and adopted.

INTRODUCTION

ORDINANCE NO. 2337

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING AN APPROPRIATION OF \$1,991,343.12 FOR VARIOUS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS BY AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF ROSELLE PARK IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$700,000 IN BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH FOR FINANCING PART OF THE APPROPRIATION

BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF ROSELLE PARK, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance (the “Improvements”) are hereby authorized to be undertaken by the Borough of Roselle Park, New Jersey (the “Borough”) as a general and local improvement. For the said Improvements there is hereby appropriated the amount of \$1,991,343.12, such sum includes the sum of (a) \$200,000 expected to be received from the New Jersey Department of Transportation in connection with the improvement described in Section 3(a)(ii), (b) \$100,000 expected to be received from a Union County Development Block Grant in connection with the improvement described in Section 3(a)(ii), (c) \$50,000 expected to be received from a Union County Kids Recreation Trust Fund Grant in connection with the improvement described in Section 3(a)(iv); (d) \$135,743.12 expected to be received from a United States Department of Energy American Recovery and

Reinvestment Act Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant in connection with the improvement described in Section 3(a)(iv); (e) \$259,600 from capital surplus in connection with the improvements described in Section 3(a)(i); (f) \$494,000 from capital surplus in connection with the improvements described in Section 3(a)(ii), (iii), (iv) and (v) and (g) \$52,000 as the down payment (the “Down Payment”) required by the Local Bond Law of the State of New Jersey, constituting Chapter 2 of Title 40A, Municipalities and Counties of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey (the “Local Bond Law”). The Down Payment is now available by virtue of provision in one or more previously adopted budgets for down payments for capital improvement purposes.

SECTION 2: In order to finance the cost of the Improvements not covered by application of the Down Payment, negotiable bonds of the Borough are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$700,000 pursuant to the provisions of the Local Bond Law (the “Bonds”). In anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds and to temporarily finance said improvements or purposes, negotiable bond anticipation notes of the Borough are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount not exceeding \$700,000 pursuant to the provisions of the Local Bond Law (the “Bond Anticipation Notes” or “Notes”).

SECTION 3:

(a) The Improvements hereby authorized and the purposes for which obligations are to be issued, the estimated cost of each Improvement and the appropriation therefore, the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for each Improvement and the period of usefulness of each improvement are as follows:

(b) The estimated maximum amount of Bonds or Notes to be issued for the purpose of financing a portion of the cost of the Improvements is \$700,000.

(c) The estimated cost of the Improvements is \$1,991,343.12, which amount represents the appropriation made by the Borough.

SECTION 4: All Bond Anticipation Notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer of the Borough (the "Chief Financial Officer"); provided that no Note shall mature later than one year from its date. The Notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer. The Chief Officer shall determine all matters in connection with Notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the signature of the Chief Financial Officer upon the Notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All Notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of Section 8(a) of the Local Bond Law. The Chief Financial Officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the Notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the

purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The Chief Financial Officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body of the Borough at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the Notes pursuant to this ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the Notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

SECTION 5: The capital budget of the Borough is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. The resolution in the form promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director, Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey is on file with the Borough Clerk and is available for public inspection.

SECTION 6: The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

(a) The Improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not current expenses, and are capital improvements or properties that the Borough may lawfully make or acquire as general improvements, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.

(b) The average period of usefulness of the Improvements within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, taking into consideration the respective amounts of all obligations authorized for the several purposes, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the Bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 30.14 years.

(c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director, Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the Borough, as defined in the Local Bond Law, is increased by the authorization of the Bonds and Notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$700,000 and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

(d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$500,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under Section 20 of the Local Bond Law is included in the estimated cost of the Improvements, as indicated herein.

SECTION 7: Any funds or grant monies received for the purpose described in Section 3 of this Ordinance shall be used for financing said Improvement by application thereof either to direct payment of the cost of said Improvement or to the payment or reduction of the authorization of the obligations of the Borough authorized therefor by this Bond Ordinance. Any such funds received may, and all such funds so received which are not required for direct payment of the cost of said Improvement shall, be held and applied by the Borough as funds applicable only to the payment of obligations of the Borough authorized by this Bond Ordinance.

SECTION 8: The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the Borough for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

SECTION 9: This Bond Ordinance constitutes a declaration of official intent under Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2. The Borough reasonably expects to pay expenditures with respect to the Improvements prior to the date that Borough incurs debt obligations under this

Bond Ordinance. The Borough reasonably expects to reimburse such expenditures with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the Borough under this Bond Ordinance. The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for payment of the costs of the Improvements is \$700,000.

SECTION 10: This bond ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

6. If the title to this property shall prove to be unmarketable, the liability of the Borough shall be limited to the repayment of the amount of any sums paid by said purchaser to the Borough without any further costs, expense, damage, claim against or liability upon the Borough.
7. The Borough of Roselle Park reserves the right to reject all bids and shall not be obligated to accept any bids.
8. All prospective purchasers are put on notice that no employee, agent, officer, body or subordinate body has any authority to waive, modify or amend any of the within conditions of sale.
