Police Chief's Monthly Report for May 2018

On May 7, 2018 I attended the 17th Annual Unity Achievement Awards Ceremony held at Kean University College which was hosted by the Union County Human Relations Commission. Detective Edward Nortrup was honored at this ceremony for assisting with relief efforts in Puerto Rico after the island was struck with a devastating category 4 hurricane on September 20, 2017. On October 21, 2017 fourteen Union County Law Enforcement Officers including Detective Nortrup who are members of the Union County Emergency Response Team traveled to Puerto Rico for a two week period to help local law enforcement with restoring law and order in the wake of the hurricane. Detective Nortrup relieved local officers in Puerto Rico who had been working long shifts since before the storm hit, and continued their work assignments during and after the storm. Local Officials and Puerto Rico Police Officers expressed their gratitude for the assistance that had been provided to them by Detective Nortrup and all of the other Union County Officers who supported the people of Puerto Rico during a very difficult time.

On May 8, 2018 the Police Department in conjunction with New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles conducted a vehicle inspection check point on Galloping Hill Road at the intersection of East Colfax Avenue. The inspection detail is designed for officers to detect vehicle safety violations and to ensure that vehicles are properly insured and registered as required by New Jersey motor vehicle laws. All vehicles that pass through the inspection check zone are also inspected for past due inspection violations, courtesy inspections are also provided for vehicles that are approaching the renewal date for required inspection. The vehicle inspection was conducted for a three hour period from 10:00 am –

1:00 pm. As a result of this detail there were 41 vehicle inspections and 13 courtesy inspections conducted by the Division of Motor Vehicles, Roselle Park Police Officers issued 15 motor vehicle summonses to vehicle operators for various motor vehicle violations. The Police Department will continue to conduct these inspection details throughout the year.

On May 10, 2018 I, along with Captain McCaffery attended the Auxiliary Police Recruit Training Academy graduation at the Union County Police Academy in Scotch Plains. Graduating from this years Auxiliary Academy for Roselle Park Police Department were as follows; Auxiliary Officers, **Vanessa Amador, Victor Pozsonyi Jr, Brian Matthews, Anthony Rodriguez, and Connor Gabriel.** The above mentioned officers will be utilized during special town events and also during storm emergencies as well as many other law enforcement functions. I applaud all of the graduates for their dedication to Roselle Park and their willingness to volunteer their time to help in providing a safer community for the residents of Roselle Park.

On May 11, 2018 between the hours of 10:00 am – 2:00 pm the Police Department in conjunction with the Union County Police Department Traffic Division conducted a child seat safety inspection in the parking lot of the gazebo park. This safety inspection was open to the public to have child seats inspected to ensure that they were installed properly and also to install new child seats for anyone who wished to provide a new car seat for installment. All car seats that were inspected or installed were done so by officers who are certified by the State of New Jersey as trained technicians in the area of child vehicle restraint specialists. Many members of the public took advantage of this opportunity and were thankful for this service that was provided to them at no cost. The Police Department looks forward to providing this service again in the very near future.

I will be attending my daughter graduation on the night of June 7, 2108 and therefore I will not be available to attend the June 7th Council meeting, Captain Daniel McCaffery will be in attendance at the meeting to answer any questions or concerns that members may have pertaining to law enforcement matters.

Police Chief's Monthly Report for April 2018

During the month of April Police Department personnel participated in a three day Active Shooter training at an unspecified elementary school within Roselle Park. Officers are trained in many different scenarios pertaining to intruders in a school building, officers are trained to utilize the best possible defensive and rescue techniques when confronted with an Active Shooter situation. The Police Department conducts Active Shooter training in all of our schools throughout the year to ensure all officers are familiar with school floor plans and how to best apply tactical techniques in the event of a threat in one of our school buildings. All Active Shooter trainings are authorized by school Superintendent Pedro Garrido and are only authorized when schools are not in session. Mr. Garrido has been very supportive of this training and continues to work very closely with the Police Department to ensure that the best possible security measures are in place in all of our schools.

On April 24, 2018 myself and Captain McCaffery attended a National School Security Information sharing seminar which was hosted by Eastern Datacomm who provide technical security equipment that is designed to improve building security. The seminar was very informative and many additional school security initiatives were brought to our attention which we plan on discussing with our superintendent of schools. As a result of the information obtained at the security seminar the Police Department will pursue added security procedures to our existing school security operations plan.

On May 1, 2018 I and Captain McCaffery met with school superintendent Pedro Garrido to discuss the implementation of additional school security/safety procedures in all Roselle Park schools. It was decided at this meeting that additional security measures would be added to the current school security policies which will enhance building security as well as safety procedures within the school and surrounding areas of the schools in the event of an intruder situation at a school building. Mr. Garrido informed us that he will also meet with Board members to discuss additional security recommendations that the Police Department has brought to the attention of the superintendent, these recommendations will require approval of the Board of Education safety committee. The Police Department will continue to meet with school officials to ensure that all security and safety procedures are adhered to and understood by all school staff members and students.

Due to a prior obligation I will not be available to attend the May 3, 2018 council meeting, Captain Daniel McCaffery will be in attendance at the meeting to answer any questions or concerns that members may have pertaining to law enforcement matters.

Police Chief's Monthly Report for March 2018

As a result of the recent school shooting in Parkland, Florida Captain McCaffery and myself have been meeting with the Roselle Park Superintendent of schools to have additional discussions pertaining to increased school security. One of the areas discussed was increased police presence at the high school during arrival and dismissal times which would serve as a deterrence to individuals who may be planning to bring unauthorized materials into the school. It was decided that a uniformed officer would be assigned to the front doors of the high school during arrival and dismissals times, this officer will be funded from the Board of Education budget. The officer assigned to the perimeter detail will not be selected from the on-duty patrol personnel schedule so this assignment will not affect the day shift patrol operations. The Police Department will continue to work with school officials on enhancing security procedures in all of our schools.

On March 2, 2018 officers from the Police Department participated in Read Across America which is a program that celebrates Doctor Seuss' birthday. Officers were invited to our grammar schools to interact with the children and read to the students in their classrooms. This program is always very well received by the children as well as the school staff. Officers enjoy the opportunity to visit with the children and speak with them on a personal level.

I am pleased to inform you that Officers William Hannon and Dean Khallaf have been selected by the New Jersey Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD) to receive the annual Mothers Against Drunk Drivers award for obtaining a large percentage of DWI arrests within Union County for the year 2017. This is an outstanding honor for these officers to be the recipient of the 2017 MADD award, I

commend Officers Hannon and Khallaf for their accomplishment as well as their dedication to their profession. The aforementioned officers will be honored at a luncheon hosted by MADD on June 12, 2018 at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, New Jersey.

I am also pleased to report that at this year's third annual **21st Century Drug & Violence Prevention Conference** Detective Joshua Medrano was selected as Instructor of the Month by the committee for **Law Enforcement Against Drugs (L.E.A.D.)**. Detective Medrano is a certified instructor for L.E.A.D. and has been committed to teaching our grammar school children on the dangers of using drugs and alcohol. Detective Medrano was chosen as Instructor of the Month for his dedication and professionalism, this is a great accomplishment to be chosen as Instructor of the Month and represent all of the L.E.A.D. instructors throughout the State of New Jersey. I commend Detective Medrano for his dedication to the children of Roselle Park as well as his dedication to his profession and the Roselle Park Police Department.

Police Chief's Monthly Report for February 2018

On February 13, 2018 the Police Department conducted a seatbelt inspection detail on Galloping Hill Road at the intersection of East Colfax Avenue. The seatbelt inspection check point is designed for Police Officers to observe and detect vehicle occupants who are not in compliance with New Jersey State law which required vehicle occupants to utilize safety restrains when in a moving vehicle. The February 13th safety inspection was conducted for a two hour period which commenced at 10:00 am and concluded at 12:00 pm. As a result of the inspection detail 8 summonses were issued to vehicle occupants who were discovered to be in violation of New Jersey State seatbelt regulations. The Police Department will continue to provide this safety program which is intended to educate the public on the dangers of failing to wear safety restraints while in a moving motor vehicle.

As a result of the tragic school shooting that occurred on February 14th in Florida I met with our school superintendent, Pedro Garrido on February 20th to discuss our current school security policies and also discussed enhanced security measures for our schools. At this meeting it was agreed that additional security procedures would be incorporated into the existing security plans that are currently in place which will enhance the safety of the students and school staff. I also informed Mr. Garrido that prior to the tragic event in Florida on February 14th the Roselle Park Police Department had already scheduled three training dates in April for Active Shooter training in our schools. This training is conducted on days when school is not in session which allows for officers to train in all areas of the schools which familiarizes officers with the layout of the buildings. The Police Department conducts these training sessions several times throughout the year.

On February 23rd I again met with Mr. Garrido along with members of the Board of Education (BOE) who are part of a school security committee that has been formed by the BOE. At this meeting we discussed short term security additions as well as long term security measures for our school buildings. This meeting was very productive with many proactive idea's pertaining to enhancing building security and safety procedures for students and staff. The Police Department continues to be dedicated to providing the best possible security in our schools, and continues to build on all current security and safety procedures to ensure the safety of all students and staff.

Police Chief's Monthly Report for January 2018

On January 18, 2018 security exercises were conducted at the Middle school, Robert Gordon School and the high school. The exercises were conducted by the Police Department in conjunction with the Office of Homeland Security, and the New Jersey State Police. There were several purposes for the exercises one of which was to observe how school staff members would react when an unknown subject would request to enter the school during school hours. The exercise also explored how school officials and staff members reacted to an intruder who was discovered in the school. I am pleased to report that during the security drills at all of the aforementioned schools the school officials and staff members responded appropriately and followed all security procedures pertaining to intruders and possible active shooter situations. The visits to the schools were unannounced and the school administrations had no knowledge that the situations they had encountered were "staged" drills by law enforcement officials. The Police Department along with the accompanying agencies also had discussions with school officials on the subject of school security and discussed additional measures that could be put in place to further enhance security procedures within the schools. The security exercises were very well received by the superintendent of schools as well as the school officials and staff members. The Police Department has always worked very closely with our school officials to ensure the best possible security within our schools to ensure the safety of the students and staff members, the Police Department will continue to update and enhance security measures within all Roselle Park schools.

On January 23, 2018 at approx. 6:15 pm a 16 year old female was struck by a motor vehicle as she was crossing Valley Road at the intersection of Beechwood Avenue. The vehicle involved was traveling

south bound on Valley Road approx. 200 feet south of Woodside Avenue when the accident occurred. The pedestrian was struck just as she was stepping up onto the curb on the west side of Valley Road, the vehicle was rounding the bend in the road and did not observe the pedestrian prior to the impact. The victim was transported to University Hospital in Newark with head trauma and internal injuries and is expected to survive her injuries. The operator of the vehicle submitted to drug and alcohol testing which were negative with no indication of drug or alcohol use, there was no initial indication that vehicle speed was a contributing factor of the accident. An assessment of the location where the incident occurred did indicate that the area is poorly lighted and there are no sidewalks or pedestrian walkways in the area. The Police Department has met with PSE&G officials at the accident site and has made recommendations for additional street lighting on the west side of Valley Road. The Police Department is also recommending pedestrian signage and a pedestrian walkway along the wooded area of Valley Road. A traffic study will also be conducted on Valley Road for north bound and south bound traffic to determine average vehicle speeds as well as the volume of vehicle traffic during various hours throughout a 24 hour period. A search of Police Department records has indicated that there have not been any other pedestrian accidents at the location in question, however the Police Department will move forward with additional traffic measures to improve safety for pedestrians walking or crossing the roadway in the aforementioned area.
